SEC. 106 REVIEW AND YOUR TRAIL PROJECT

What is Sec. 106 review?

- ✓ Refers to Sec. 106 of National Historic Preservation Act, as amended (P.L. 89-665, et seq).
- Consultation triggered by federal/state agency permit, licensing, funding, or funding guarantee
- ✓ Typically includes (lead) federal/state agency, SHPO, & interested members of the public
- ✓ Based on professionally done field survey, historical research, comprehensive documentation that meets federal standards

Sec. 106 review (cont'd)

Consultation concerns *cultural resources*, i.e., historical and archaeological sites, buildings, structures, districts, and objects. Includes landscape features & Traditional Cultural Places:

- ✓ Are they present?
- ✓ If yes, are they significant, i.e., eligible for listing in National Register of Historic Places (NRHP)(36 CFR 60, 36 CFR 63)?
- Are they likely to be adversely affected by trail construction? Direct or indirect effect? Level of effect?
- ✓ What are options to minimize, avoid, or mitigate adverse effect?

106 Review for SC Trails

- ▼ Typically includes review by SHPO & State Archaeologist
 - * Federal funding: FhWA, NPS, Land/Water Conservation Fund)
 - Federal permit: USACOE, RUS, HUD, etc.
 - ❖ Federal license: FERC
 - Trail construction on federal property (e.g., USFS, NPS, other land-based agencies)
 - Trail construction for SCPRT (state-owned properties)
 - EXCEPTION: Annual FhWA Recreational Trail funds coordinated through SCPRT
 - Occasional due diligence review, esp. if asked

106 Review for SC Trails (cont'd)

For new trail construction, SHPO reviews:

- Extent of proposed ground disturbance
- Proximity to known historic/archaeological resources
- Proximity to areas of high archaeological probability

Typical SHPO recommendations:

- Whether HP identification/cultural resources survey is needed
- Guidelines for such survey

NOTE: Cultural resource survey is NOT recommended for every new trail construction project reviewed

106 Review for NC Trails

- ✓ Typically review is required by SHPO & State Archaeologist for:
 - * Federal funding: FhWA, NPS
 - Federal permit: USACOE, RUS, HUD, etc.
 - Built on federal property (e.g., USFS, NPS, other land-based agencies)
 - * Federal license: FERC
 - Trail construction for NC Parks , CAMA for coastal counties (state-owned properties)
 - State land if NR listed property will be affected (GS 121.12a)
 - Consultation is typically on county by county basis Currituck Co. has written requirement for consultation w/ SHPO on county property and grants
 - Always willing to provide guidance on CR documentation/protection/avoidance or due diligence review

106 Review for SC and NC Trails

SHPOs and THPOs typically recommend that if federal funds/permits/licenses are needed or if project is on federal/state land, sponsor should assess proximity of proposed trail to known historic/archaeological resources as well as potential construction impacts as early in planning process as possible.

NOTE: SHPO is not involved in 106 consultation/review if:

- Federal funding/permits/licenses are not needed for project
- Project will not be located on federal/state land
- Any decision regarding cultural resource survey or public consultation would be made at local level.






Monitoring Map - Catawba Trail




Prehistoric Artifacts, Catawba Trail Surface After Clearing - Monitoring Phase

- c) Possible LeCroy CSPP (Early Archaic)
- d) Unifacial scraper
- e) Unmodified biface blank ALL VEIN QUARTZ

 - Contact potential archaeological contractors for interest and/or bids
 - Work closely w/ your contractor re: scheduling, prep requirements, documentation that you need
